Details of Stonemasonry Training Modules

The following modules will be covered during the 20 days of training:

L3 Award in Repair and Maintenance of Traditional (pre 1919) Buildings -3 days

This accredited 2-day course is an essential addition to the Continuing Professional Development (CPD) portfolio for professionals in the construction and heritage construction

industries. It combines theoretical knowledge with practical examples and demonstrations to equip participants with the core competencies required for working on traditional (pre-1919) buildings. The course focuses on understanding materials, methods, legislation, and safe practices critical to preserving historic structures.

Key Topics Covered:

- 1. **Value of Traditional Buildings** Understanding their historical significance, performance characteristics, and their role in sustainable practices.
- 2. **Legislation and Guidance** Overview of legal and policy frameworks guiding repair and maintenance.
- 3. **Traditional Methods and Materials** Emphasis on using appropriate techniques like lime work and avoiding incompatible repairs.
- 4. **Condition Assessment and Planning** Techniques to assess, research, and plan effective conservation strategies.
- 5. **Safe Working Practices** Ensuring safety while preserving original building fabric and knowing when to seek expert advice.

Knowledge and identification of materials – 2 days

Understanding the use, composition and application of lime and clay mortars is central to successful maintenance and repair of traditional buildings. With a wide range of lime products available on the market, this module will provide a solid understanding of different types of lime and their appropriate use. It will also cover the selection of aggregates as this is vital in determining the appearance and performance of traditional lime and clay mortars. This course will also help you to determine the appropriate mix of lime binders and additives and assessing the appropriate combination to suit the task.

The content of the course will include:

- The range of stone and brick used in heritage work
- · Lime mortars and the lime cycle
- Use of earth and clay
- Lime wash
- Lime putty
- Roman Cement
- Aggregates and pozzolans
- Modern breathable materials
- Storing materials
- Salvaging re-usable materials

Defect recognition, causes and effect for heritage stonemasonry- 1 day

For buildings which have been standing for 100 years or more, wear and tear, patina and features out of plumb can all contribute to their historic character. However, understanding when a character trait becomes more of a defect and consequentially a risk to the stability and sustainability of the building, is something that is essential for a stonemason to appreciate. This module will investigate damage caused to a building through weathering, chemical attack and movement and discuss appropriate interventions to prevent further decay.

The content of the course will include: Identify damage and inappropriate materials

- Staining and salt activity
- Weathering
- Structural issues
- Inappropriate interventions
- Decaying/ rusting ironwork

Site visit to illustrate defects

Specialist Techniques for stonemasonry – 1 day

Understanding plans, drawings and specifications is essential in ensuring that repair work is undertaken according to the requirements of a contract. This module will enable learners to interpret drawings accurately in preparation for any new or repair work to masonry structures.

The content of the course will include:

- Reading from plans and specifications
- Disseminating information, identifying discrepancies and the procedures for further actions
- Scale drawings
- Setting out datums and complicated stonemasonry structures
- Measuring tools and instruments old and new.

Stonework conservation, repair and maintenance- 3 days

This module will support learners in the understanding of Conservation philosophies and principles and SPAB principles. Using an existing stone structure as a case study, learners will practice producing Heritage Impact assessments, Conservation management plans, Risk Assessments and method statements.

Setting out and erecting complex stone masonry structures- 10 days

On completion of this module learners should be competent to undertake repairs to historic stone walls using methods appropriate to the original wall construction. It will include repairs and fixing on rubble, semi-dressed and dressed walls.

The module will include a practical project giving the learner experience in producing projecting courses using stone and mortars; stabilising a section of stone wall using simple mechanical repairs and alterations; Identification of existing repair joints age-related nature.

The course content will include:

- Recognition of historical significance
- Carrying out reversible alterations and impact assessments
- Choosing the correct joint for repairs, minimum intervention.
- Recognising previous interventions
- Tools of the trade
- Types of shoring
- Types of foundation
- Construction joints used in masonry structures
- Different types of walling construction
- Projecting courses, arches and steps
- Consolidation
- Grouting
- Resins, reinforcements fixing, support fixing and reconstituted stone
- Fixing structural anchors
- Tamping and pointing
- Cutting out defective mortar

Details of the NVQ3 Assessment

What level of skill and knowledge to I need to be able to access the level 3 NVQ?

Before you can access the NVQ3 you would ideally have an NVQ2 in the same trade. However, very often, people have learnt their trade on-site.

The best way to find out if the NVQ3 is the right level for you is to arrange an Initial assessment of prior learning or knowledge with a qualified assessor. During this assessment, you will discuss your previous work experience, any training you have completed and how site ready you are.

How does the assessment process work?

As the learner works on site, as normal, they will need to gather evidence of tasks that are relevant to the NVQ3 Units. Evidence can include assessor observations. This is when the assessor visits you on site as you are working on relevant tasks. Other evidence can include written reports, videos of you working and expert witness testimony.

How do I know what tasks are appropriate?

You will be provided with full details of the evidence that you will need to provide during your induction. Your assessor will discuss each unit in your qualification to ensure that you are able to provide the evidence required.

The assessor will be looking for evidence of a candidate's own work, and that it has been carried out to the appropriate standard. You will need to evidence product, performance and knowledge in relation to the qualification.

How long is the assessment process- can I complete in less than 18 months?

You will be expected to complete your assessment within 18-months of starting the training. If you can complete all the tasks and demonstrate competency of knowledge in less than 18-months, you can complete sooner. If you are not able to complete within the 18 months due to unforeseen circumstances, it is possible to apply for an extension.

Can any of my prior learning or experience count towards my NVQ3 qualification?

There are circumstances where very recent learning can be transferable. It is worth discussing your individual experience with Tom.

Do I have to attend all 20 days of training?

If you are following the Specialist Applied Skills Programme, you are required to attend all 20 days of training.

What happens if my employer doesn't have enough appropriate work?

Before registering you onto the qualification, we will discuss your future work plan the learner and the employer. If the situation occurs that a learner is not getting the relevant work for assessment, we are able to support you to find opportunities with other companies.

Additional Information Learning needs:

As part of the registration programme, learners will be asked about their learning support needs. If these are disclosed, we will act appropriately to cater for the learner.

Insurance:

The employer of the learner confirms that the firm's public liability, professional indemnity and employers' liability insurance all extend to the learner's involvement in the training and assessment programme.

Certificate:

The issue of the NVQ certificate is from the awarding body and may take 3 months from the end of the assessment period to arrive with the learner.
